**ER Is a Lifesaver for Werntz Family** 

The last thing Linda Werntz remembers before her subarachnoid bleed is working out on her Nordic Track. Her husband, Don, remembers the events that followed with vivid clarity. "Her life was saved three times in nine hours. It was a very scary experience," he explains.

#### **SAVE #1**

Don, a local radio personality and sportscaster with Big Radio, credits Star Ambulance for the "first save" keeping Linda alive at their home in Freeport. "I was working in my home office recording shows and for some reason I felt the need to go downstairs. I heard moaning in the basement and I quickly knew something was wrong. Linda could not communicate well, had a terrible headache, and had thrown up. When I realized she would not make it to the car for a trip to the ER, I called Star Ambulance. In that short time - less than five minutes until the ambulance arrived – her body stiffened and her condition was clearly deteriorating. When I saw Tom Kempel, the EMT, doing CPR, I couldn't believe what was happening."

Linda was transported to the ER at FHN Memorial Hospital, where a CT scan identified her critical condition. According to Don, "Dr. (Chris) Gruber\* met with me to explain the severity of the situation. I was told this type of aneurism is often fatal. In fact, 90 percent of people who experience this type of bleed don't make it or have significant deficits."

#### **SAVE #2**

As Don processed Linda's ominous outlook, Dr. Gruber was taking action

to get her transferred to a center of excellence for brain trauma. "I didn't know this at the time," explains Don, "but he saw the need to change the typical rotation usually used to transfer patients and insisted she be moved to OSF St. Anthony in Rockford, which is widely seen as a leading regional center for head injury. In my opinion, and according to our neurosurgeon in Rockford, that was Linda's second save."

Don is full of praise and appreciation for Dr. Gruber.

He was professional and calm while exuding

strength and a sense of command. I needed that at a time when I felt very vulnerable. His competence helped me keep it together and gave me resolve to take this one step at a time. He was just the right combination of smart, experienced, and compassionate."

#### **SAVE #3**

Linda had several brain surgeries in Rockford in the following days, which stopped her brain from bleeding. Since then, she has had subsequent admissions to FHN, UW Madison, and Van Matre Rehabilitation. She has been fighting to regain her strength and good health for more than two years now, but continues to make progress.

"She is a miracle, and I am so grateful to all the healthcare professionals who saved her life," says Don, "and to our sons for their support. Ryan is a physician in Florida, so he was wellequipped to ask the right questions via FaceTime and help me make medical decisions. Our younger son, Adam, had the flexibility to move his work office from Chicago to our house in Freeport, so he provided tremendous support on the home front. This experience has reminded us all how fragile life is, and how much we appreciate our family and our community's healthcare capabilities."

Linda is grateful too. "Thank God FHN's ER was close by and equipped to help us through a very dangerous healthcare crisis," she says. "I am sure thankful for all the people who helped pull me through, with Don being number one on the list. He saved the day. What if he hadn't come downstairs when he did?" she surmises. "He is my hero – my knight in shining armor – my constant support. I don't know what I would do without him."

First Patient Receives New Robotic-Assisted Knee Replacement

FHN Orthopaedic Specialist Excited about Precision and Accuracy of Innovative VELYS™ Technology

When FHN orthopaedic surgeon Greg Dammann, MD, asked Kimball Sturtevant if he was fine with having FHN's first VELYS robotic-assisted knee replacement surgery, his patient's response was enthusiastic: "Sure! I am all for this modern technology improving our lives!"

Years of farming and truck driving had left Kimball's legs worse for the wear. "Climbing silos and grain bins, working on balers, and general farm work wore my knees out," he explains, "and then driving truck took its toll." His first knee replacement with Dr. Dammann, on his "clutch" leg, was a success several years ago. This time, it was for his right leg, the one used for the gas pedal and braking. "The doc predicted I would be back for the second one, and he was right. I had a lot of pain on the inside of my knee, and I was noticing it every day. I couldn't even get comfortable just sitting in my chair. It was time."

#### NEW TECHNOLOGY PROVIDES PRECISION, ACCURACY, AND FLEXIBILITY

Dr. Dammann is thrilled to be the first in the area to offer patients this sophisticated new option. "I am always looking for ways to use technology to improve patient outcomes, and the VELYS™ Robotic-Assisted Solution is going to provide that progress," he explains. "It gives me real-time information up front - detailed data on six different parameters that help balance the knee. So I end up doing less soft tissue dissection and more personalization for each individual patient's unique anatomy. Since every knee is different, the end result really is a customized knee!"

Specialized training and job shadowing helped Dr. Dammann master the new technology, which built on the programs he had used in the past. He says, "I already had experience with computer navigation, and this robotic approach is the next step in improved outcomes, enhancing accuracy and precision. I consider it a very state-of-the-art assistant! I am confident the real-time data the system provides will result in faster healing, less time in physical therapy, and decreased need for pain medications – all wins for our patients."

# PATIENT ON THE MEND IN RECORD TIME

As for Kimball, he went to physical therapy one week after surgery and was pleased to learn he needed fewer sessions than originally planned. "I have already seen lots of improvement," exclaims Kimball, "and my therapist, Deeann Heinrich, really gets the job done. She is so thorough and caring. My pain has been minimal and I am more flexible than they expected I would be, so my PT has been reduced from three times a week to two times a week. I consider that pretty amazing progress. I feel like R2-D2 was on the job!"

Of course, many things about FHN's orthopaedic procedure process remain the same, including help from nurse navigator Keri Wall. "That Keri is a huge asset," stresses Kimball. "She is worth her weight in gold. She made the whole experience so much easier. The hospital staff was excellent, too, and Dr. Dammann, well, I think he is the best ortho guy in the area. FHN's orthopaedic team is a well-oiled machine, and as an old farmer, I can say that."

Knee replacement patient Kimball Sturtevant has high praise for Dr. Greg Dammann and Nurse Navigator Keri Wall. "They are part of a well-oiled machine," says Kimball.

While he was being treated for cancer, Bob Downing enjoyed talking with his oncologist, Dr. Arshad Shaikh, about their shared love of sports cars. In June, Dr. Shaikh had a chance to take Bob for a spin around town in his Corvette. Bob's family and team of Cancer Center caregivers was there to wish him well as they left the Center's patient entrance.

A common question I am asked by both physicians and lay people alike is why did I choose to practice oncology? Some see it as a depressing and melancholy profession and wonder how it is possible to continue to stay upbeat in such a field.

My response is that much of what shapes my cognitive frame and how I hone and practice as an oncologist is guided by perspective. Life is all about perspective. My perspective is guided by my faith. It is always important to look beyond the immaterial, despite how much modernity tempts us to focus more on the material. One thing is certain: We will physically die and pass from this temporal existence.

A beloved patient of mine whom I had gotten to know quite well over the past year was slowly dying in front of me. I learned that he had never actually driven a Corvette. That had always been a dream for him.

Medicine is not categorically about the outcome. It is about the journey. Life is about memories. Ultimately, what matters is how you make people feel and how families remember how you treated them and


their loved ones. That is all that matters. Do unto others and treat people as you would want to be treated yourself.

### Jeff Lamm Fights Cancer and Leg Wound with FHN's Expertise

## - 'You bump your leg and your life changes'



A wound from a hematoma left a gaping hole in Jeff's leg, and complications kept it from healing. The professionals at The Center for Wound Healing at FHN recommended a "wound vac," which provided the right conditions for skin rejuvenation and served as a catalyst for the restorative process. When Jeff Lamm was on vacation in Florida, he never dreamed that banging his leg on a boat would put him in the hospital and signal the start of a long healthcare journey. As he says, "You just never know. It was freakish."

After bumping his leg, the injury quickly accelerated into a hematoma (an abnormal collection of blood outside of a blood vessel). "It blew up with blood," Jeff shares, "and the swelling just kept building. So I went to the ER for evaluation, and they told me that ruptured arteries would need to be drained. Well, that was just the beginning."

#### A TELLING TEST

A CT scan showed that Jeff also had follicular lymphoma, a type of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma that would require additional treatment. After spending a week in the hospital, he came home and went to his primary care provider, FHN's Julianne Ross, FNP-BC, who made some important referrals. She suggested he confer with The Leonard C. Ferguson Cancer Center at FHN Memorial Hospital for his lymphoma regimen, and The Center for Wound Healing at FHN for his battered leg, which was not healing well.

Jeff was treated simultaneously for both conditions. "I lucked out with an easily treatable form of cancer," he explains, "and everyone at the Ferguson Cancer Center was great. Dr. (Arshad) Shaikh and Julie Nampel (Director) were excellent to work with, and all the staff were so helpful. I had chemo once a month for six months, and will keep being evaluated every two months for two years. I feel good about my future."

#### **A STUBBORN WOUND**

Jeff's hematoma, however, left a gaping hole in his leg and his wound care challenges were formidable. At his first visit to The Center for Wound Healing at FHN, the wound was debrided and assessed by Dr. Rafael Castro, MD, FACS, WCC. Since wounds may not heal as well when a patient is receiving chemo and taking blood thinners, Dr. Castro determined that a wound vacuum would benefit Jeff's recovery. Terri Groezinger, PA-C, says, "Our staff has seen incredible results with the help of this sophisticated tool. It applies gentle suction to a wound to promote healing, while drawing out fluid and infection."

"The staff at the wound center was meticulous," Jeff explains. "Early on we thought I might need a skin graft, but the wound vac helped me heal and make new skin. I visited the Center three times a week for over five months, and at each appointment they changed my dressing, checked for



infection, and measured and photographed my wound to document my progress. It was incremental – it definitely took a while! But we started to see reduced swelling, and slowly but surely my wound healed and the pain subsided. I am so grateful for them and for my wife, Kathy. Without her, none of this recovery works. She is REALLY my better half."

#### A PAIN-FREE ENDING

Now, Jeff has 'graduated' from The Center for Wound Healing and is pain free. "I can't say enough about my care!" he exclaims.

"The doctors and nurses were excellent – professional, personable, and wonderful communicators. They were all encouraging and compassionate throughout the long process. I am very pleased with FHN. They did an awesome job with both of my health challenges and I am so happy they were right here in Freeport."
