Karlene Johnson Appreciates Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain's Attentive Care

- 'So Glad FHN is Here for Me'

Karlene Johnson is "always learning" – a student of life through both education and experience. That's why she brings a notebook with her to every healthcare appointment. "I need to make notes so I can document my experiences and research what I don't understand," she shares.

One reason she chose **Tamisha Bonvillain**, **FNP-BC**, **IBCLC** as her primary care provider is because Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain is a good listener and a patient explainer. "She takes her time with me and describes procedures and medications in detail, which of course I make note of. She is thorough, kind, and knowledgeable."

Karlene calls Tamisha Bonvillain "Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain," rather than Tamisha, because she respects the hard work put in to earn her credentials. "It may be a small thing," she shares, "but using that title is my way to respect her perseverance, education, and experience."


Primary Care Knows the Big Picture

Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain helps watch over several health issues and guides Karlene through challenges that arise. "I have AFIB, high blood pressure, problems with stomach acid, and 'thick blood,'" says Karlene. "I get monthly bloodwork done, and Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain reviews my numbers and manages necessary changes. I trust her to keep it all straight. And though I did not pick her because she is Black, I do think it is wonderful to have diversity in the ranks at FHN. I have been happy with my selection!"

Karlene is especially aware of the challenges that come with AFIB, and remembers the day it became a problem. "I had just had knee replacement surgery and was in the hospital doing PT. I got tired very suddenly, and then felt dizzy and sweaty – it was obvious that something was off. Tests and consultations with cardiac care showed that I had AFIB, which may have been brought on by stress tied to caretaking. With regular care and medication, I am happy I don't have problems with it very often," she explains, "and my nurse practitioner is aware of all that history."

Be Preventive

To stay as healthy as possible, Karlene adopts a common-sense approach, focused on prevention and approved by Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain. "I stay as active as I can, and don't allow myself to sit around. I monitor my hydration, eat the right vegetables, and follow 'doctor's orders.' And I love to socialize. Friends and family play a major role in my positive outlook. I believe one's mental health is an important contributor to overall wellness," she notes.

Indeed, relationships and social well-being are a core component of Karlene's life. Though she has worked at seven jobs, many have focused on her degree in human services, where she learned to advocate for the power of connection.

She considers herself "a helper," and currently shares those skills by working part-time as a Community Development Coordinator at the

Boys and Girls Club of Freeport and Stephenson County. "These kids have so much potential," she emphasizes. "If we can get them to embrace that potential, maintain their mental health, and avoid opiates and alcohol, they can be beacons of light."

Be Positive

She also loves to travel, read, watch Western movies, and collect horses and elephants (trunks up!). A cruise to the "ABC Islands" was her most recent adventure, and she says it won't be her last. "I love the ocean," she enthuses, "and I enjoy heading to Las Vegas to visit family. It's all part of my overall wellness plan!"

Though Karlene depends most on Nurse Practitioner Bonvillain, she appreciates the network of providers she consults as needed for unique concerns, and is grateful that FHN offers a breadth of specialty care. "I am so glad FHN is here for me.

I see Nurse Practitioner Chelsea
Hartzell (gastroenterology), Dr. Khan
(nephrology), Dr. Bell (podiatry), Dr.
Isawi (ophthalmology), the entire
bloodwork team (phlebotomy),
and others when necessary. And
I also have to mention Dr. Laporta
in anesthesiology, who was so kind
to me, giving me a darling stuffed
elephant and praying with me before
my procedure. She was special. Life is
special ... and I count on all of these
healthcare professionals to help me
maintain my quality of life."

To celebrate being alive, Karlene threw herself a party last August for her 70th birthday. As she nears her 71st, she is contemplating a new beginning – a possible master's degree in social work. "Many of my family members have attained that distinction, and I think it might be time for me to join the club," she shares. "Life is short. Enjoy it! Go for it! And make a difference."



PRIMARY CARE: THE FAMILY DOC FOR OUR TIMES

It may sound old-fashioned, but having a family doctor is one of the best ways to achieve your (and your family members') best health.

They go by different names these days, like family medicine, internal medicine, and pediatric medicine physicians, nurse practitioners and physician assistants, but their goal is the same: To help you feel your best.

PART OF YOUR TEAM

Your family doctor (also called a primary care provider or PCP) serves as the coach of your FHN team dedicated to keeping you healthy. Call

his or her office if you come down with a bad cold that just won't go away, a rash, or other minor illness or injury, but that's not all.

You should also schedule a "check-in" with your PCP at least once a year, even if you're in great shape and in good health. We'll check your vital stats like height, weight, and blood pressure, and your provider will do a brief exam. This is your time to ask questions and bring up your concerns or questions – anything from trouble sleeping to whether you should be taking a certain vitamin or supplement.

Getting your "vitals" during this visit also gives your provider some important information about your general health. Is your blood pressure running higher than in the past? Having hypertension (high blood pressure) can put you at greater risk of heart attack or stroke, and there are lifestyle changes you can make to help bring those numbers down.

SPECIALTY CARE ON YOUR TEAM

Having a primary care provider also gives you quick access to FHN's specialty care providers, should you need them. If your PCP is concerned your twisted ankle could be badly sprained or broken, we'll work with FHN's orthopaedic team to get you in and seen by one of our specialists.

FHN has providers in more than 40 specialties, and we work with hospitals and health systems in Rockford, the Chicago suburbs, and the University of Wisconsin – Madison to make sure our patients have access to the specialty care they need.

COMMUNICATION MADE EASY

There's an additional benefit to having an FHN primary care provider – MyFHN. Our online patient portal lets you manage your healthcare online, from checking on appointments and requesting prescription refills to getting test results. MyFHN also gives you a convenient way to ask your provider a non-emergency question – send a secure email to him or her through MyFHN and you'll hear back within a business day or two.



FIND A PRIMARY CARE PROVIDER

It's easy to find a primary care provider (PCP) at FHN. Our physician referral specialists are trained to help you find a provider who's right for you. Call us Mondays – Thursdays from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on Fridays from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. at 815-599-7060, and you'll have an appointment before you hang up the phone!

FHN'S PRIMARY CARE TEAM

FHN has more than 30 primary care providers at offices throughout northwest Illinois.

You'll find a number of specialties and credentials among our primary healthcare provider team. Whether you choose a physician, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, your PCP will be able to diagnose and manage acute illnesses and injuries and stabilize long-term chronic illnesses in collaboration with other members of your healthcare team. They prescribe medications and order and interpret laboratory tests, x-rays, and developmental and screening tests to identify their patients' health problems, risk factors, and strengths.

FHN's NURSE PRACTITIONERS

are registered nurses (RNs) who have continued their education and clinical healthcare training and have earned a graduate degree in advanced practice nursing. A nurse practitioner can actually earn a doctorate in nursing! A number of the providers on FHN's primary healthcare provider team have

earned DNP credentials, the highest level of certification.

Nurse practitioners take a special exam after training in their area of interest. The credentials after a nurse practitioner's name are his or her area of certification, followed by –BC, which stands for Board Certified. Common certifications include:

FNP-BC – board-certified family nurse practitioner

GNP-BC – board-certified geriatric nurse practitioner

ANP-BC – board-certified adult nurse practitioner

CNM-BC – board-certified nurse-midwife

NPWH-BC – board-certified nurse practitioner for women's health

AGACNP-BC – board-certified adult gerontology acute care nurse practitioner

FHN's nurse practitioners can serve as primary healthcare providers to people of all ages, including newborns. They focus on working with their patients and providing all the information

necessary to make informed decisions about any treatments needed.

Our PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS

(identified by the credential –PA) have received a broad education in primary care with a specific emphasis in the practice of medicine. Most physician assistants have received their master's degree in an intensive medical program generally lasting two to three years, and are licensed to practice medicine in cooperation with a physician.

FHN's physician assistants don't currently provide primary care, though they can serve as primary healthcare providers, conducting physical exams, diagnose and treat patients' illnesses and injuries, and provide preventive healthcare counseling as well as write prescriptions.

FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND CEO, MARK GRIDLEY

On behalf of FHN's Board of Directors and the entire FHN team, I'm pleased to share our Annual Report for 2023.

Like so many other healthcare organizations in the United States, FHN is facing a number of challenges, from spiraling costs and declining admissions and birth rates to an increasingly complex payor system and government-created shortfalls.

In our case, these circumstances led to total net income loss of more than \$2.6 million in the past year. We are working hard every day to meet this challenge, endeavoring to be wise stewards of our resources and your generous gifts to the FHN Foundation.

Some healthcare systems across the state haven't been so fortunate. A few Illinois hospitals have been forced to close, and others have been taken over by larger entities, taking local decision-makers out of leadership.

We believe that a community healthcare system helmed by members of that community, with their families' and neighbors' health top of mind, is vital to a healthy community.

Decisions about our local healthcare system are made with careful attention to our most recent Community Health Needs Assessment, which outlines the needs of our community and ways we can help enhance our neighbors' health.

The strength of our communities is just that – community – and we have been fortunate to be able to partner with other organizations to provide some of the services and resources that can make northwest Illinois healthier.

When another organization can fulfill a need for our communities, we have made the wise decision to carefully and thoughtfully transition away from that service in order to conserve our resources.

We are proud to continue investing in our most valuable resource, our FHN team. Together, we care for thousands of patients each year – an average of about 1,500 daily visits to our 16 locations spread across five northwest Illinois counties.

All of us at FHN are proud to be your locally governed healthcare provider, and we thank you for the privilege of caring for you.

YOUR DONATIONS AT WORK - STAFF TRAINING, EDUCATION, AND SEMINARS

Devoted to supporting FHN's focus on education and staff enrichment, the Foundation helps healthcare students gain their credentials and assists existing team members as they grow and flourish in their respective fields. Here are a few examples of how we have encouraged staff development, planned ahead for our community's future healthcare needs, and maintained our commitment to continuous training and education – all critical components of excellent care.



STAFF TRAINING

Learning opportunities abound for FHN's staff members, and the Foundation is here to financially support many of these requests for support.

Clinical Skills Mannequin: Recent nursing graduates, certified nursing assistants (CNAs), and certified medical assistants (CMAs) have a new way to practice an array of clinical skills and assessments. Sam, a fully equipped clinical skills mannequin, was funded by donations to the FHN Foundation. This lifelike device, which can be set up as male or female, is used to simulate a full range of procedures, such as airway opening, IV insertion, Foley catheter placement, and chest tube insertion. Because it is completely portable, it also allows the hospital's Code Blue Committee to do more realistic mock codes in every department with clinical staff – over 350 team members.

IMPACT: Improved patient care and increased staff confidence.

PT Training for Parkinson's Disease: People diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease often demonstrate smaller and slower movements that impede their daily life. This makes tasks such as getting around or getting dressed difficult. Whitney Holmes, PTA, received special "BIG" Lee Silverman Voice Treatment (LSVT) certification to help these patients. She is the second member of our physical therapy group to achieve this distinction.

IMPACT: Enhanced mobility for patients with Parkinson's Disease, and more trained staff to help them.

Pelvic Floor Function Education: Allyson Wilken, PTA, had the opportunity to further her education in Level 1 Pelvic Floor Function through the Herman & Wallace Pelvic Rehabilitation Institute. She works alongside another colleague to treat a variety of pelvic floor dysfunctions such as urinary incontinence, fecal incontinence, pelvic organ prolapse, pelvic pain, interstitial cystitis/painful bladder syndrome, and constipation – all common problems that may be eased with treatment.

IMPACT: Increased ability to support current pelvic health patients and reach more patients who would benefit from treatment.

CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS

Health professionals who participate in conferences and seminars stay on top of new technologies and treatments and share their expertise with others in their fields. The FHN Foundation is proud to support them as they reach new levels of performance in multiple specialties. The listing below gives you an idea of the kinds of opportunities created by our donors.

Cardiology: Clinical Exercise Physiologist Molly Hey, MS, CEP, and Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Nurse Krista Montgomery BSN, RN, attended the American Academy of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation (AACVPR) 38th Annual Meeting. This organization is considered the "gold standard" in the world of Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehab. Learning sessions included Medicare Rules and Regulations in Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation, Guidelines for Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehab program certification, and DASH Diet for Cardiac Rehab patients, to name just a few. Molly and Krista have already integrated this new information into FHN's program, with excellent feedback from patients.

IMPACT: Furthered continuous improvements to our well-regarded cardiac and pulmonary rehab program.

Obstetrics: OB Educator Keri Schubert, RNC-MNN, BSN, Perinatal Quality Nurse Danielle Wittig, BSN, RN C-ONQS, and Women's Health Service Line Director Linn Carter MSN, APN/CNS-BC, NEA-BC traveled to the Illinois Perinatal Quality Collaborative (ILPQC) Face-to-Face Annual Conference in Springfield, Illinois. Both Keri and Danielle were invited to be speakers on FHN's Promoting Vaginal Birth (PVB) quality initiative. The three also presented their quality boards on not only PVB, but also Birth Equity and Antibiotic Stewardship for Babies projects. ILPQC's conference hosted 88 delivering hospitals from Illinois and the St. Louis area. FHN's OB department is an active member of ILPQC.

IMPACT: Recognized leaders shared their expertise and networked with other professionals about state-of-theart OB care.

General Medicine: Clinical Professional Development Specialist Tammy Staderman, RN, NPD-BC, CMSRN, and Supervisor of Clinical Resources, Jessica Larson, DNP, RN, joined others in their specialty at the University of Iowa FULD Evidence-Based Practice (EBP) Summit. They were invited to do a 20-minute podium presentation on FHN's EBP Fellowship program, which benchmarks other organizations and evaluates best practices to improve safety and quality in FHN's care.

IMPACT: Researched and implemented best practices to improve FHN's procedures and processes.

Cancer Care: Director of Oncology Risa Tyler, BSN, RN, attended the Association of Community Cancer Centers (ACCC's) Annual Conference. It provided valuable networking connections with leaders at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center and MD Anderson Cancer Center, and featured workshops on genetics; the impact genetic sequencing has on cancer treatment; and healthcare inequities.

IMPACT: Made valuable connections and improved understanding of new ways to approach cancer care.

YOUR DONATIONS AT WORK - NEW EQUIPMENT

One of the ways your donations make a difference is to help purchase new or updated equipment that enhances patient care or improves internal processes. Thanks to monies generously provided to the FHN Foundation, we were able to procure a variety of items for a broad array of uses. Here are just a few examples:



PAIN CLINIC BED

A new procedure bed for the Pain Clinic maneuvers easily so that the physician is able to achieve multiple angles of imaging where the patient feels discomfort. This helps ensure that the correct areas are being treated. Twelve to fifteen patients use this piece of equipment during their procedures each week.



IPADS FOR HOSPICE STAFF

New tablets were needed in hospice. because the existing iPads were dated and no longer accepted updates for charting software. This made recording or accessing hospice patients' vital information a challenge - and made new iPads a priority. The new tablets provide staff with the capability to chart within a patient's house any time, day or night, which

helps to keep information up-to-date and gives hospice nurses more time for direct patient care.



IMPACT: Improved care for hospice patients.

BARIATRIC SCALE

The Community Health Center (CHC) and the Stephenson County Health Department (where the CHC is located) did not have a scale capable of accommodating someone over 440 pounds, which made it more challenging to serve larger-sized patients. A new bariatric scale, provided by the FHN Foundation, was gifted to the CHC so they can improve care for these patients. Now, the new scale helps the staff better monitor weight loss/gain, and more accurately prescribe medication dosages and measure fluid balance.



IMPACT: More accurate diagnostics and overall care for large patients.

NEW STATE-OF-THE-ART SURGICAL TOOLS

FHN's busy orthopedic group received a new Stryker Power 8 system to continue providing excellent care to its patients who need total joint replacements and hip fracture repair over 300 each year. The set includes several new saws, drills, and support tools developed specifically for orthopedic, orthopedic trauma, and sports medicine surgeries. New, larger batteries last more than two times longer than the previous equipment without needing replacement, and are also designed to decrease surgical site infections.



IMPACT: Enhanced surgical outcomes for joint replacement and hip repair.

When women have a cesarean section, Halo and Amico cribs offer a special maneuverability near and over the bed so new moms can comfortably care for their babies after surgery.
